As a teaching assistant, I once assisted in grading a set of assignments for a research psychology course. To grade each of the 60 eight-page papers, I had to: Read the paper once through. Grab a printed grading rubric (a chart listing all the assignment requirements and how they are scored) Read the paper.

Take the number of correct answers and divide by the total number of questions.
